Street

The street department was busy through the winter with snow and ice removal. It has been a long rough winter on the employees, the equipment and the budget. We haven't had a winter like this in years. Now that the winter is over the patching of potholes will begin. This winter has taken a toll on our streets leaving almost every street in town with potholes. It will be a process for the crew to keep up, so we appreciate your patience as we work to get everything done along with the weeds and the mowing that will have to

be done. However, on a good note; the maintenance shop is finally done with all the construction from the fire. The walls are insulated and the new heaters will make the shop more energy efficient. Both street and park crews have been attending safety seminars this winter when possible to keep all employees safe while on the job.

Park

During the winter months, the park department assists the street department with snow removal along with their regular duties of maintenance and getting park benches and trash barrels painted for the spring/summer season. Repairs are made to equipment during the winter as well. Ball season has started and the crew has gotten the ball fields ready for this seasons play.

Spring Cleaning at the City Cemetery

As winter recedes, our thoughts often turn to spring cleaning. Cleaning up after a long winter is not limited to households. The City also has spring cleaning chores. The roads are full of the material used in our battle with snow and ice, the parks are littered with limbs and branches that fell during the winter hiatus and equipment used in our annual battle against the elements needs to be cleaned and conditioned for storage until the next year. An additional spring duty is to plan for the maintenance of the City's cemetery.

The City is committed to perpetual maintenance of its cemeteries. The citizens support this through the payment of a cemetery tax. The only thing for which the tax proceeds can be used is cemetery

maintenance and improvements. To ensure the cemetery grounds are properly maintained, the owners of plots have agreed to follow certain rules. These rules are posted at the cemetery and available in city hall. As we prepare for the mowing season it is important to remember what the owners must do to facilitate maintenance. If you own a cemetery lot please remember the following:

- 1. Decorations are only allowed on the headstone monument and must be permanently attached or properly secured.
- 2. Flowers are to be maintained and removed when they become faded and unsightly.

- 3. The use of grave blankets is limited to the period of November through April and must be removed in the spring.
- 4. One "eternal" or "memorial" type light is permitted and must be securely mounted on the tombstone.

To implement proper maintenance the City will have to remove and dispose of flowers that have become unsightly or detached and may remove all non-conforming materials.

By working together we can make sure our cemetery remains a source of pride for our community.

Your Yard is Calling You. What is it Hiding?

Spring is a busy time of year for relandscaping and digging. Remember to call Missouri One-call (DIG-RITE) before digging. They will notify utility companies who will come out and mark underground utilities free of charge. Let's make your landscaping a safe addition to your yard.

It has been an un-usually harsh winter. Check your exterior water faucets and sprinkler system (if any) for frozen pipe damage that may have been caused by leaving a hose attached or not draining properly.

Spend a little time now- save your earnings from now on. Remember to check your toilets to see if they are running or refilling constantly and check your interior faucets for drips. A drip-drip-drip of water is a drip-drip-drip of money! Taking a little bit of time now to correct these small issues can save you that hard-earned money that is going down the drain. Add these items to your home maintenance monthly check list. Doing this can save you buckets of money over time.





Swimming Pools and Permits

Summer will finally be arriving soon and gone will be the memories of 12-inch snow storms and the pain of an aching back. This past winter you might have dreamed about floating in a nice, cool swimming pool under the nice HOT sun and then, you decided that this will be the year. This will be the year that you take that long-awaited tax refund and purchase the above ground swimming

pool advertised yearly in the Super Walmart ad!!! The Building Department does not want to burst any dream bubbles, but we do need to remind sun-starved residents that building permits **are required** for the installation of any above or in-ground pool over the depth of 24 inches! Plan review on pool installations include, but are not limited to, electrical connections, site location and

your pool's safety/security plan. Playing in the summer pool can be a shocking experience if it is not installed correctly.

Permit applications and plan requirements **are given away** at City Hall, Monday through Friday from 8:00 -5:00 p.m. Come on in a pick one up — it could save your life.

Nuisance Violations; Weed Complaints, Grass Clippings, Etc.

SPRING HAS FINALLY ARRIVED!! And with the arrival of spring time showers and gully washers comes the sudden growth spurt of your fresh new lawn, complete wildflowers, dandelions, poison chickweed and an assortment of colorful vegetation. Once again, the City of Ste. Genevieve wishes to remind everyone that Ste. Genevieve does enforce a nuisance ordinance which defines a property with more than **7 inches** of vegetative growth i n the yard as a nuisance (trees, bushes and flowers, don't be alarmed- this does not apply to you!) . Lucky property owners found in violation of the ordinance may receive a personal visit from a member of your friendly Ste. Genevieve Police Department who may also be inclined to enter your name into a drawing for a nuisance citation. This citation would win you a back stage pass at municipal court AND also a personal meet and greet with our municipal judge!

If you break your leg (or worse yet, your lawn mower) this summer and have no way to cut your grass, there is no need to fret!!

The folks at city hall have compiled a list of individuals and companies that are eager to cut your grass or maintain your lawn for you. This **elite list** of lawn care operatives can be yours, *free of charge*, upon request. Or perhaps **you** would like to have your name or company added to this exclusive list and become a lawn care operative yourself. Just call city hall at 883-5400 and submit your application!

Property owners are also asked to be mindful of any plants, shrubbery or tree that growth near streets (or **over** them!) that may create a traffic hazard by blocking the vision of motorists. Plants and trees next to public **sidewalks** should also be trimmed to allow free, unimpeded use by pedestrians and postal carriers. As we always say, nothing spoils an evening stroll like being slashed across the face by a sticky bush!

While we are on the topic of sidewalks, please allow us to remind you that trashcans are not to be kept on the **sidewalks or streets** longer than 24 hours after it has been collected. Yes, there is a city ordinance and it also restricts placement of

trash containers on the curb or sidewalk no earlier than **24 hours prior** to your scheduled pickup. So, PLEASE let's not force anyone to walk the streets because your trashcan was blocking the sidewalk, ok?

Back to lawn care.....residents are also verboten to blow grass clippings onto city sidewalks and streets. Yes, we greatly appreciate the way that you keep your lawn nice and trim and below seven inches in height; however, grass clippings that are blown onto the street get washed down the storm sewers, eventually clogging the drain and backing up into your neighbor's yard. So please be mindful and when cutting the grass, aim the clippings away from the sidewalk and street and away from any flower beds!!

If you would like to submit a high weed/grass complaint or any nuisance concerning a vehicle, trash or debris, complaint forms can be picked up at City Hall, 165 S. Fourth Street. Return the completed form to City Hall, 165 S. Fourth Street or contact the Police Department at 573-883-3999.

New Sign Ordinance

In 2012, the city adopted a new sign ordinance that not only regulates the placement of commercial advertising signs but also where garage and yard sale signs are allowed to be posted. More to the point, this ordinance stipulates where these posters and flyers are not allowed!! Last year you may have been an unhappy recipient of special document sent from the Planning and Zoning Administrator entitled, "Notice of Violation." Or you might have

spotted a woman running around town, ripping down colorful and carefully-posted flyers and then stuffing them in the back of her car. Despite coffee shop chatter, this woman **did not** stealthfully steal flyers that others had posted in order to reuse them for a special garage sale of her own. No, no. This woman was enforcing the city's new regulation against posting signs, flyers, posters or any other advertisement upon utility poles, trees or public property!

This year, should you desire to have a garage sale – and you know you do – please remember to observe the new ordinance that prohibits the use of public property for personal advertisement. Signs, no larger than four square feet, may be posted on private property (with the permission of the owner, of course!); however, if posted offsite, the sign MAY turn into an ugly Notice of Violation letter if not returned to its owner within forty-eight hours after the sale!!
