

Controlling Mosquitoes During the Summer

Even a spoon full of standing water can produce mosquitoes. If you have any questions, or wish to report a mosquito problem, please call City Hall at 883-5400 and a representative will perform an inspection and offer suggestions for controlling the insect population.



YARD & HOME CHECKLIST

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, or any water holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low places in yard.
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly.
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water.
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use.
- Change the water in bird baths at least once a week.
- Keep grass cut short so adult mosquitoes won't hide there.

Resurgence of the Ste. Genevieve Summer School of Art

Local Art Guild Hosted A 'RESURGENCE' of the Ste. Genevieve Summer School of Art

Who knew that our town had a history as not only an artist colony in the 1930's but also that Ste. Genevieve was the site of a Summer School of Art as well?! Many local and regional art enthusiasts helped commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Ste. Genevieve Summer School of Art with a series of summer art activities that were hosted by the Ste. Genevieve Art Guild.

The "Resurgence of the Summer School of Art" activities in Ste. Genevieve MO began the second week in June with Billyo O'Donnell, www.billyoart.com, an internationally known plein artist and

new member of the prestigious group, The Plein Air Painters of America, giving a demonstration. The second week, Dan Woodward, www.woodwardartstudio.com, American realist whose "Impressions of the Civil War in the West" exhibit is currently traveling, gave a workshop the next weekend. The final weekend featured distinguished artist, Bryan Haynes, www.artbybryanhaynes.com who conducted a workshop on the portrayal of figures in the neo-Regionalist style. Often called the new regionalist artist of the 21st century, Haynes' work has graced the pages of national magazines, CD covers, posters, and book covers from Agatha Christie to the cover of "Scarlett," the sequel to Gone With the Wind.

Other unique events held during the 80th anniversary included a reception and showing of Matt Zeigler's works at the Felix Vale State Historic Site, an open air portrait session hosted by the Bolduc House Museum and held in the garden of the Jean Baptiste Valle house, and a ferry boat 'float trip' on the Mississippi River on June 20th to mark the Summer Solstice.

Yard Waste Disposal Site for City Residents

The Ste. Genevieve Police Department wants to remind the public about the proper use of the city of Ste. Genevieve's Yard Waste Disposal Site, as there have been many occurrences of misuse in recent months. The Yard Waste Disposal Site, located near the levee access road at N. Main Street and Division is intended as a place for Ste. Genevieve city residents to dispose of yard waste. According to the city's ordinances, yard waste is defined as "garden waste, leaves, lawn cuttings, weeds, pruning, shrubs and tree waste generated at residential or commercial properties located in the city limits of the City of Ste. Genevieve." It does not include tree

stumps or limbs over six (6) feet long or over twenty-four (24) inches in diameter.

It is a violation of the ordinance to place any substance other than yard waste into the city's Yard Waste Disposal Site. This includes hot embers or ashes. Use of this site by non-residents or misuse of the site is illegal. The Ste. Genevieve Police Department will be increasing patrol of this site, and anybody found to be misusing the site, using it without authorization, or found to be responsible for setting any fire not authorized by the city will be charged and summoned to court.

Good Watering Practices for Plants

The heat of summer is here. Home gardeners may fear that they won't be able to properly water their gardens. Nothing could be further from the truth.



In many cases we may find that our watering practices are wasteful and inefficient. For established plantings, deep, infrequent watering is recommended. Weekly applying one deep watering will encourage deeper rooting, which leads to stronger, healthier plants. Shallow, frequent watering, on the other hand, will lead to shallow root systems and high water loss through evaporation. With shallow watering, such as light frequent sprinkling, you actually end up wasting

quite a bit of water and still don't meet the needs of your plants.

The best time of day to water is early morning before the temperatures begin to rise. This gives the plants a good supply of water to face the heat of the day. Early morning also tends to be a time of lower winds and thus reduced evaporation. Oscillating lawn sprinklers are the most common used devices for watering lawns. The drawback to them is that up to 50 percent of the water put out can be lost to evaporation or drift. Water may also be delivered unevenly to lawns, since more water is dispensed near the sprinkler. The sprinkler must be moved around to provide even watering over the entire lawn.



Soaker hoses have become very popular. They can be very effective devices for watering vegetable gardens and flowerbeds too. Soaker hoses allow water to weep out gently over the entire length of the hose. Another benefit to using these hoses is that the leaves on vegetation and flowers are never wet, reducing the possibility of diseases. The water goes right to the root system where it is needed and very little is lost to evaporation. Soaker hoses can be left on for a length of time to water deeply. When faced with summer watering, save yourself time and money by carefully selecting the time and watering device which best suit your watering needs.
